Learning with Carne...

We have been playing many number games in maths and practicing forming our numbers correctly. We are getting good at finding lots of different ways to make numbers up to 10. Year two have been building on this learning by investigating fact families. We love being mathematicians in Carne Class.

We are really excited to explore what Being a historian is all about. We have been thinking about our own favourite toys that we play with in the present day and we cant wait to take a careful look at some of the old toys that some children have brought in. WE will continue to look at the similarities and differences and make conclusions about how toys have changed within living memory.

We have been thinking scientifically to describe materials and their properties during the introduction to our Everyday Materials and their Uses topic. We loved making these feely hands to separate and identify different materials we found in our classroom. Can you guess the use of any of them ?





Learning with Kiberick

In the last week of the half term Kiberick had lots of exciting learning opportunities. To end our World War 2 topic, they started the day by re-enacting the life of an evacuee by taking a trip on a steam train on the Bodmin Wenford Railway, we then went onto The Bodmin Keep to continue learning about the life of an evacuee and other WW2 facts.


Some of the older students also took part in a Netball tournament, which was held at the Roseland School, where we finished in 3rd place out of 9 schools! We also, held a mini Art gallery, where we shared thoughts on each other's art work. To conclude our Science topic, we spent the morning at the Church, experimenting with 'How can the size of a shadow be changed?'

To launch our new topic this half term, we started off our week with a morning learning and researching Anglo-Saxons. We then baked and compared peasant and Royal Anglo-Saxon bread. Surprisingly, the majority of the class preferred the peasant bread which only consisted of flour and water! This has been followed with writing up our very own instructions in English. In Art this week we researched Anglo-Saxon brooches, selected our favourite three, annotated and used these for inspiration in order to design our very own Anglo-Saxon brooches.

Bodmin keep trip...I was very lucky to be able to accompany Kiberick class on their visit to Bodmin to experience what life must have been like for children in World War 2. We re-enacted an evacuee train journey and then visited The Bodmin Keep, finding out about life at War from toys to rationing, evacuation to air raid shelters. We have several compliments during the day about how beautifully behaved our children are and how proud we must be. We are very proud !





Netball... The Veryan team did fantastically well at the Roseland Netball festival. They won their group and went on to come third overall in the competition. Throughout the tournament, our children played fairly and with great enthusiasm. They were a credit to our school.



Sailing... For our final sailing session before half term, the wind was too strong to sail so the children went out on kayaks instead. We went over to St Mawes too for an ice cream to finish. What a perfect morning!





Illness...

It's the time of year when there is more illness about. As COVID-19 presents a low risk to children and young people, there are no longer specific rules relating to it in <u>schools</u>, colleges, <u>childcare</u> and other education settings.

Children and young people with mild symptoms such as a runny nose, sore throat, tickly cough, who are otherwise well, can continue to go to school, college or child-care.

However, those who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people where they can. They can go back to school, college or childcare, and resume normal activities when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.

Testing for covid is unnecessary, if your child is unwell they should not come in, if they are feeling well enough, and do not have a temperature, they may come to school.

Why is Year 6 being weighed and measured?

The school nursing team is visiting Year 6!

We are going to measure the weight and height of Year 6 pupils as part of our work to help keep the nation healthy.

Did you know?

- Children are weighed and measured when they are babies, and again in Reception and Year 6.
- It helps the government see how healthy the nation is, and plan health and leisure services for children.
- It's a good chance to check how you're developing and think about ways you can become healthier.

What will happen?

- You will be measured one at a time in private.
- All you need to do is take your shoes off – it will be really quick!
- Only your parents or carers will see the results - not your teachers or friends.

Top tips for a healthier you

Everyone can find ways to be healthier - what can you do today?

1. 5 a day

Try to eat five portions and a variety of fruit and veg every day.

3. watch the salt

Check the label and choose foods lower in salt and try not to add salt, to your food.

5. get going every day

Spend at least 60 minutes walking, playing sport, running around or being active every day.

2. cut back fat

Try and keep foods like crisps, buns, cakes, pastries and biscuits as occasional treats only.

4. sugar swaps

Swap sugary drinks for water, lower-fat milks, no-added-sugar or sugar-free drinks.

6. me size meals

Children need smaller portions than grown ups. Free School Meals

If you think you may be eligible for Free School Meals the criteria and link you will need to follow are below. Not only would your child receive free meals but this enables the school to access additional funding. If you would apply by post please contact the office for a paper application form.

Free school meals eligibility criteria if you receive benefits

A child is eligible for free school meals if their parent/carer (or the child themselves) receives any of the following benefits:

Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods).

Income Support (IS)

Job Seekers' Allowance (Income-Based) and equal based Job Seekers Allowance

Income Related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA-IR) and equal based Employment and Support Allowance

Child Tax Credit (CTC) with an annual income of less than £16,190

Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Guarantee Element of Pension Credit (GPC)

Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 (IAA) Supports

If you are claiming the benefits listed below you are not eligible for free school meals. This is regardless of what other benefits/credits are being claimed.

Working Tax Credit

Contribution-Based Job Seeker's Allowance and/or Contribution-Based Employment and Support Allowance




Cornwall Music Trust...
