

Lent in the church is such a sparse time with no flowers and I look forward to Easter when colour can return. The grass in the churchyard is getting rather long and each time the weather has been good enough to cut it, we have been busy doing something else. Hopefully, April will bring dryer weather.

The faculty for the bell frame has been approved and the contractors will start work in June.

The PCC have agreed to a new paved path to the church and a faculty will need to be got for this work. It is hoped at the same time to put an electric light out to the Lych gate. I was rather shocked by the quotes for the paving stones.

In March the PCC did a course on Domestic Abuse as part of the C of E safeguarding policy.

At the Easter Vestry on the 11th April our secretary and treasurer, Pat Farr, is standing down, after many years of service. Thank you, Pat, you've done a Stirling job. We are a very small PCC and could really do with some more members.

We now look forward to the celebrations for the Kings Coronation. On the 8th May we will be holding a Coronation Tea in the Reading Room from 3 until 5. Hopefully see you there.

Work is still ongoing to improve the look of the church. Many people will have now seen that the West porch has been freshly painted and work is now underway to improve the South porch. The bell ringing chamber has been finished and is looking so much better.

Major work is planned for the tower and contractors are now being contacted for quotes etc.

The PCC has seen a change recently. Christine who was acting as temporary secretary has handed the position over to Mandy, welcome aboard Mandy. The PCC also did a course on Domestic Abuse.

The Easter Vestry will be held in the church on the 10th May, which will be chaired by the new oversight minister, Reverend Douglas Wren.

Seeds of Growth Germs of Promise

on the Way is a much bigger mission than I had first realised. It is an ongoing programme of evolution for 'the church' in the diocese of Truro and who knows may beyond ...? My first contact with it was in relation to the issue of parish priest vacancies on the Roseland. This issue and the resolution adopted remains controversial, however, I want to shed light on some very positive germs of promise that have come as part of this programme.

Transforming Mission: Joff Phipps, Social Justice

Missioner (based in the Cathedral reporting to Rev'd Canon Alan Bashforth)

This mission has developed several regular opportunities for people to meet together, for emotional and spiritual nurture and support, at places other than church! For example, a very successful football and surfing club has been established, which is attended by in excess of 40 people each week. Joff is very keen to work with communities in all parishes to support the development of these opportunities across the diocese.

Mission to the Poor:

Lowest Income Communities Fund (LICF) funding had been received (£60,000 per year over three years) from the Archbishops Council and the Church Commissioners.

Erica Payne leads this mission with the assistance of Sam Payne.

This role only began in December but seeds of growth have definitely been sown. The concept of a 'dockyard' has been established, Erica described it as being a safe haven where anyone can 'dock' and gain the care and assistance they need. A central Truro venue was being sought for this virtual concept to exist in the physical world. Also a free cafe now runs alongside the Foodbank at All Saints, Highertown. This is a safe space to eat, drink and talk. Signposting to other services was possible but the principle aim was to provide a safe space. Erica was keen to visit Churches to help identify their own areas of deprivation and possible action.
